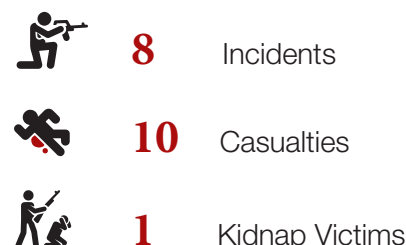

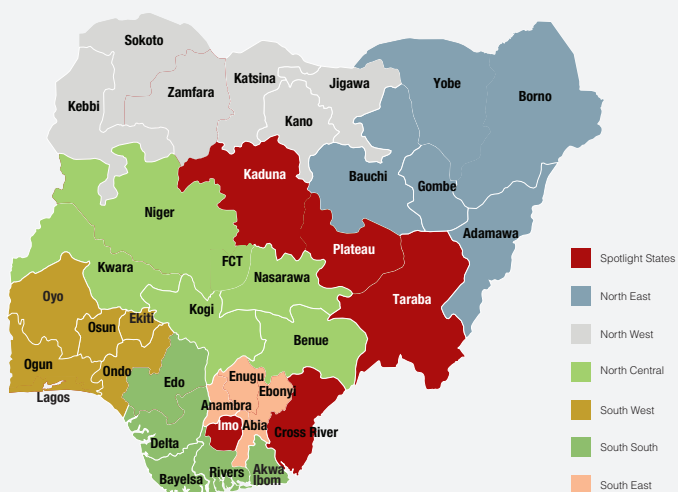

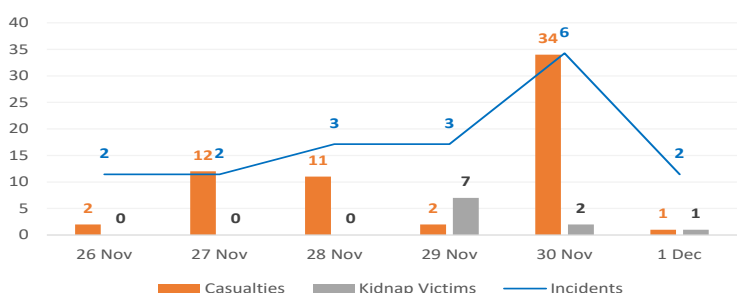

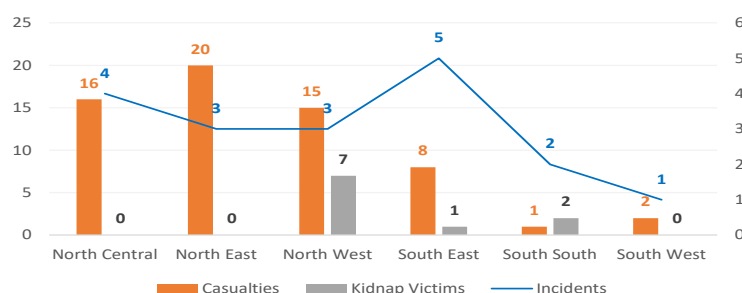

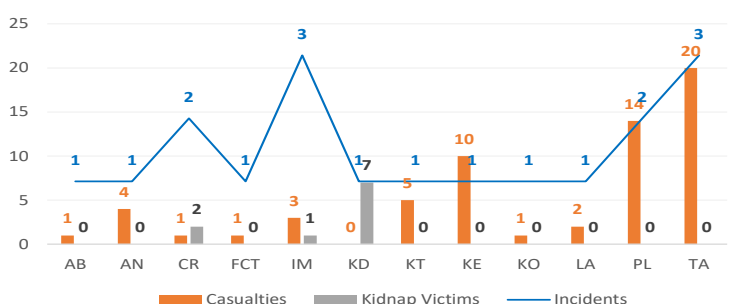

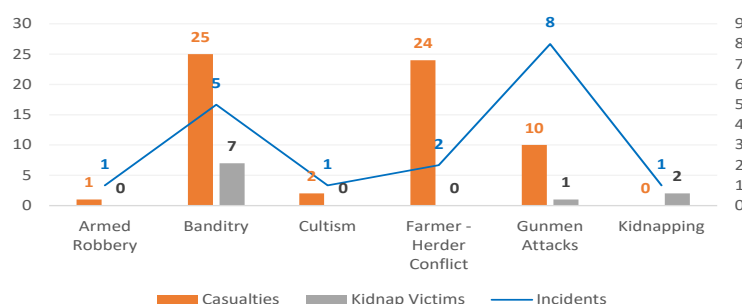
Nextier Violent Conflict Data by Region

The Nextier Violent Conflict Database recorded 18 violent incidents across 12 Nigerian states between November 26 and December 2, 2023. These incidents resulted in 62 casualties (44 fatalities and 18 injured victims) and ten kidnap victims. Violent incidents and casualty counts increased while the kidnap victims tally decreased compared to the [previous week](#). Taraba state ranked the highest in fatality count, recording 20 cases. The [attack by bandits](#) on hunters in Maihula community in Bali Local Government Area (LGA) contributed to the high fatality count. Taraba and Imo states recorded the highest incident tally, with three cases each involving bandits, civilians, farmers, informal security actors, yet-to-be-identified gunmen and security personnel. Seven persons were abducted in Kaduna state within the same period. Gunmen violence remains the most prevalent conflict type, with ten casualties (nine fatalities and one injured victim) and one kidnap victim from eight incidents. Banditry is second, with five incidents resulting in 25 fatalities and seven kidnap victims. The South East region is the most troubled in this review week (26th November - 2nd December 2023), with five violent incidents resulting in eight fatalities and one kidnap victim.

The data presented in this report are from Nextier's Nigeria Violent Conflict Database which collates violent conflict incidents across Nigeria from field sources and media-reported violent conflict incidents.
